Call to Order

Chair Angela Nissing called the meeting to order at 10:02 AM.

Approval of Minutes

- Sep 17th meeting minutes were reviewed and approved as written.
 - o Motioned: Patricia Maloney; Seconded: Leah Scharlott.

Constituent Concerns

- Sally McClean shared concern regarding large number of emails faculty receive regarding College news and announcements meant for students. Would like clarification on what emails can go directly to students or what communications faculty should share during class time.
 - o Dr. Nissing will follow up with Prof McClean with a response.

Guest Speaker – Tracey Bodo, *American Association of Women and Community Colleges-MC Chapter*

 Presented an overview of the AAWCC – including its mission, representatives, guiding principles, goals, and events – to encourage membership among MC staff and, in particular, MC faculty. Presentation attached.

Discuss and Finalize ASC Goals for AY25-26 - Dr. Angela Nissing, *Academic Services Council Chair*

• Dr. Nissing showed shared document featuring ideas from Council members since the previous meeting. Highlighted focus on increasing students' awareness and access to

college resources and supports. Reminded Council members to propose guest speakers to present at ASC meetings and provide guidance on strategies to achieve ASC goals.

- Discussion among Council members included:
 - Ensuring faculty and staff who regularly interact with students are aware of what services are available to students and how to direct them to those services.
 Perhaps utilize Starfish as a platform to communicate these services (Rebecca Thomas)
 - Can build upon an existing resource developed by the WDCE Council (Transcie Almonte-Sabio)
 - A <u>resource guide</u> from FY24-25 is also available and being used among Counseling & Advising faculty. ASC can collaborate with WDCE Council to not only build upon this existing work, but also ensure a guide that is more navigable and user-friendly (Dr. Deidre Price)
 - There are two components: information collection and delivery/communication of information. ASC can play a larger role on the latter (Dr. Angela Nissing)
 - Consider accessibility when communicating resources to students. Make information mobile-friendly. Solicit IT for support (Michelle Chan)
 - Need to consider the "best" way to reach students without overloading them with information, e.g., emails (Dr. Angela Nissing)
 - Information can be shared via Blackboard and MyMC (Dr. Mike Mills & Josiah Ridgeway)
 - Communications sent via SMS or Push on the MyMC app has been effective at TechMAP (Oscar Flores via Zoom chat)
 - In determining goals, consider having language be informed by what the ASC plans to measure (Dr. Deidre Price)
 - This may mean having two distinct goals one measured according to impact on students, one on faculty (Rebecca Thomas)
 - Possible strategies for achieving goals
 - Conduct surveys on student usage of services at start of AYs. Students can be given a monetary incentive, e.g., \$5 Starbucks card (Tracey Bodo)
 - Must consider effectiveness of using surveys to collect data, i.e., surveys often yield few responses (Dr. Angela Nissing)
 - Invite speakers from various areas to ASC meetings for guidance on how to communicate resources to students and faculty, e.g., Academic Affairs regarding FYE orientation and onboarding (Dr. Angela Nissing)

- Implement a communication push for services with existing data, e.g.,
 laptop loans, to measure what modes of communication work best
- Purge outdated information and keep MC website up-to-date so students and faculty have access to correct information regarding services (Michelle Chan and Leah Scharlott)
- Need for data collection
 - Is there data on what services are underutilized? Prioritize awareness of these services/resources (Verhonda Sercey)
 - In building resource guides, consider raising awareness on underutilized services more broadly, e.g., tech access can be through DLCs and libraries in addition to laptop loan program (Dr. Deirdre Price)
 - Information about underutilized resources can inform subgoals (Rebecca Thomas)
 - Can connect with OIRE for data on students' usage of services and course success rates (Michelle Chan)
 - Departments collect usage data independently, which is not necessarily connected to OIRE (Dr. Deirdre Price)
 - Starfish is being used to collect data on Learning Centers usage (Dr. Mike Mills)
 - Capturing data on laptop requests can be an opportunity to promote such services to students (Dr. Mike Mills)
 - Do WDCE student have access to laptop requests? (Transcie Almonte-Sabio).
 - Need to look into this concern further, but WDCE students do have access to computers in the libraries and DLCs (Dr. Mike Mills).
 - A caveat: Need to also look into how to prioritize requests and length of class students are enrolled in (Dr. Deirdre Price)
 - Connect with Student Affairs on student population/demographic information collected on MC's enrollment application, which is currently being revised. This can inform what services individual students may need (Dr. Deirdre Price)
 - Utilizing AI, e.g., chatbot, to not only make information about services more accessible, but collect data on what students and faculty inquire about (Michelle)

- Dr. Angela Nissing recapitulated discussion, noting:
 - Two goals tentatively identified: increasing awareness of resources for students and separately for faculty
 - Strategies include: inviting guest speakers to ASC meetings, implementing a communication push, gathering existing data on student usage/under-utilization of resources and services, and collecting new data for pre/post comparison

Chair's Report - Dr. Angela Nissing, Academic Services Council Chair

 Dr. Nissing presented college-wide information for council members disseminate to constituents, including reminders of Staff Enrichment Day, Inclusion by Design Summit, Humanities Days, speaking event featuring Dr. Gerald Horne, Fall Alumni Social, Middle States reaccreditation information session; availability of the Annual Security Report 2025 online; Student Basic Needs Survey; and campus events, including Prescription Drug Takeback Day, Mobile Health Center, African Immigrant Heritage Month and Hispanic Heritage month celebrated at the MC libraries. Presentation attached.

Old Business – Tracey Bodo, *Academic Services Council Vice Chair*

- Prior constituent concerns
 - Closed: "Deadnaming" students. Issue was tied to Accudemia. Starfish is current scheduling platform and is linked to Banner, so preferred name can be used.
 - Closed: Calculators for WDCE students. Concern regarding renewing a license will be handled by WDCE department.
 - o Closed: IT support for evening/weekend faculty. Referred Operational Services.






